

uring the summer of the 2010-11 Academic Year, the Co-op Ed programme was introduced as a pilot to a small selection of 2nd – 4th students enrolled in the Bachelor's in Business Administration programme with the following specializations:

- ♦ Human Resource Management
- ♦ Accounting
- ♦ Marketing


These are offered by the School of Business Administration in the College of Business and Management.

The Business Jamaica Limited (BJL)*, one of UTech's longstanding Co-op Ed partners, responded to the University's

call for Co-op Ed partnership in these "new" areas. Accordingly, four students were requested from the piloted specializations.

The response to the placement opportunities with the BJL was overwhelming. However, this interest dwindled significantly when students were made aware of the stipend being offered. Miss Mickella Johnson, a final year student, was one of seven students who remained very optimistic about the internship opportunity and who was eventually placed at the BJL for six weeks. She worked assiduously and

displayed a positive attitude toward all tasks assigned. Johnson's supervisors were impressed by her general work attitude and pleasant disposition, so much so that when a permanent job vacancy arose while Johnson was on placement, she was immediately considered.

The Co-op Ed Unit, having learnt of Johnson's job offer, sought to interview her regarding her personal reflections on the Co-op Ed experience at the company and the (perceived) factors that led to her latest accomplishment.

The brief interview is as follows:

LGB: What motivated you to participate in the Co-op Ed programme knowing that, for you, the programme was optional?

MJ: I did this programme to gain additional experience in order to enhance my career despite the programme being optional and the minimal stipend received

LGB: How were you prepared by the School (SOBA) for the Co-op Ed programme?

MJ: I was coached on how to conduct myself in a work environment and to be productive in all that I do. I was prepared to work with other people in order to meet any objective that was given

LGB: What were your expectations of the Co-op Ed programme and to what extent was each met?

MJ: I expected this Programme to be a learning experience and this

expectation was met as I became knowledgeable in using several software applications

LGB: Outline briefly the main tasks to which you were assigned.

MJ: I was given a number of tasks such as filing, preparing payment vouchers, writing cheques and generating journals in their applications

LGB: How did you react when you were made a permanent job offer?

MJ: I was extremely overwhelmed...

LGB: Is this permanent position aligned with your career goal?

MJ: Yes it is, as my academic major was accounting and I am currently a payroll clerk

LGB: What would you say to change the mindset of your fellow peers to think positively about work experience?

MJ: The work experience landed me a permanent job and it proved to be very instrumental in helping to build my confidence level and making me well- rounded

LGB: Your closing thoughts...

MJ: The programme has proven to be a valuable experience and I would encourage other students to grasp such opportunities.

Co-op Ed: A Global Perspective

n June of last year, a team of three Co-op Ed Co-ordinators from UTech attended and presented at the *World Association on Co-operative Education (WACE)* Conference held at Drexel University in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. There were over 300 member institutions representing 23 countries in attendance.

From the outset it was evident that there were serious partnerships existing among employers, academia and governments in WACE member countries. The plenary sessions and keynote addresses supported this and included stimulating presentations from:

- ◆ Jane Oates, Secretary for Employment and Training in the United States Department of Labour, who spoke passionately on "The 3R's of Federal Workforce Development Policy: Rigour, Relevance and Return" and the successes achieved through its implementation.
- ♦ A panel comprising corporate executives of General Motors, Hilton Worldwide, Merck and Research in Motion/Blackberry whose discussions centred on "The Talent pipeline: The strategic value of Cooperative and Work Integrated Education" to their respective companies.

Another highlight of the Conference that stimulated much dialogue among Conference participants was that of using international Co-op Ed exchange programmes to prepare students for diverse jobs in the global market place. Presentations on this area included "Cultural Intelligence: Developing Students who can Act Local and Think Global" and "Becoming Globally Engaged Citizens through Cooperative Education"

Coming out of this Conference, the resolve of the University's Co-op Ed Unit has been to intensify its search for international Co-op Ed exchange partnerships with a view to increasing the employment competitiveness of our graduates. We invite dialogue from our stakeholders in this regard.

About the Co-op Ed Unit


